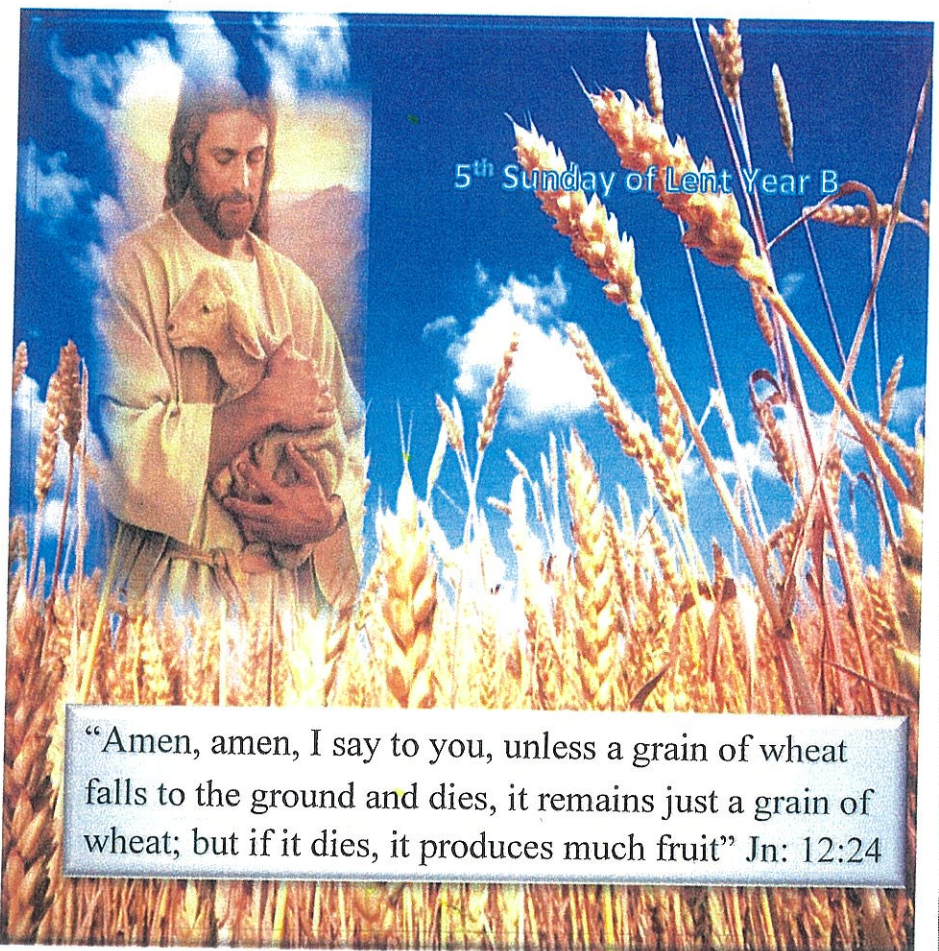

I am one of 5 children, my parents raised in the Catholic faith. We all attended K-12th grade at a Catholic school. We attended church regularly, and our parents were very involved with the church. They volunteered a lot of their time with youth groups, fund raisers, work projects, 'You name it'.

Then I left home for college. At the age of 25, I got married in the Catholic Church (my husband was not Catholic.) Five years later, we had a beautiful son, who was baptized in the Catholic church.

As a family, we never attended mass together, and we divorced after 10 years of marriage. Though we raised our son lovingly, and he has grown into a respectable, kind and caring young man.

I married my current husband, Brian, and we have been married now for 21 wonderful years. We had our son, Cal in 2003. For those of you that knew him, you were blessed. My mother played a huge part in bringing him into the Catholic faith. He and I began attending mass together, although not regularly. When Cal was about 8 yrs. old. He and I later became members of SEAS. He had wanted to be baptized, so he and I attended RCIA together in 2017-2018. He received his 3 sacraments on Easter 2018.

Tragically, our son was involved in an MVA 6/4/20 and passed on 6/7/20, at the age of 16. I miss him immensely every day. But, I never once blamed God, nor was I ever angry with him. In fact, my love for God became stronger. My husband started attending mass with me, and we have been going regularly. He then chose to take RCIA in 2022. Unfortunately, he is still waiting to receive the 3 sacraments. The delay is due to getting an annulment for my first marriage.

My new faith journey began on the day our sweet boy, Cal passed. Though I live my life with an enormous void and profound sadness for my loss, my faith in God and my relationship with him has deepened. And I have our son to thank for that. I thought "no parent should ever have to lose a child. It's not the natural order of life". But then I think of our Cal and in my mind, I see him with our Savior in heaven and for a moment, I'm at peace. I can and will always see his smile and hear his laugh. I believe our Cal was privileged and chosen to go Home early.

I'm still trying to figure out the meaning of it all, knowing there has to be a purpose and what it means for me and my life here on Earth. My husband, Brian and I will continue on our faith journey together, as one.

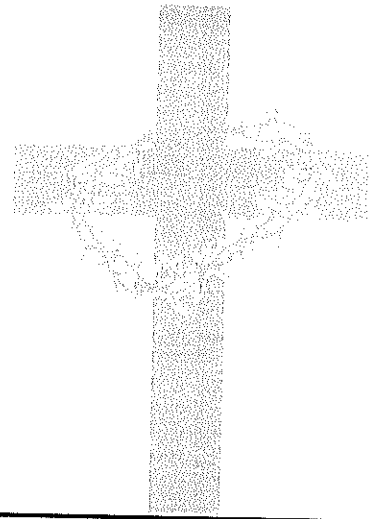
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40 Ways to Get More out of Lent

22. Invite someone who doesn't regularly attend Mass to come to Church with you. But also invite them into your life and your home. After all, your family is the domestic church!
23. Reach out to the least important, least popular, most ignored person at school, home, or work. In any social setting you are in, seek out and talk to such a person first, before you talk to any of your friends. Then introduce your new friend to your old friends, so that he or she feels less alone or excluded.
24. Read or listen to a biography of a saint.
25. Begin or widen the practice of a family Rosary. Explore the Scriptural Rosary, a book that inserts a brief Bible quote between each Hail Mary, thus making the meditation dimension of the Rosary much stronger.
26. Make it a daily practice to pray for the Holy Fathers' intentions, which are truly universal, and also at least one particular need beyond the frontiers of your native land.
27. Meditate on the Lord's passion every Friday. Either make the Stations of the Cross or pray the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary. You can do this either alone, or better yet, with others.
28. Visit someone lonely in the neighborhood, in the hospital, in a nursing home or in prison. Call or text someone elderly or isolated in your family.
29. Establish the habit of making an examination of conscience each night before bed.
30. Prayerfully consider making a pilgrimage. It could be to your diocesan cathedral, or to a monastery nearby. Or you could make plans to go to Guadalupe, or Rome, or the Holy Land.
31. Before work, chores, or study, make a conscious decision to offer up whatever you are doing in love of God and in loving intercession for some person or special need.
32. Pray regularly for those whose rights and dignity are trampled and for those responsible for their pain. Look for a way to help.
33. Look for opportunities to volunteer for the lowliest, least-desirable jobs, and serve those who are least worthy and least grateful.
34. Find out what the Sign of the Cross really means, and begin making it less mechanically, more thoughtfully, several times per day as a renewal of your personal commitment to your Lord and savior.
35. Learn the Prayer of Abandonment to Surrender your possessions, your future, and your life to God as you slowly pray it daily.
36. Give thanks daily for your own cross—the trials and misfortunes in your life—with the confidence that God will turn them to good.
37. Learn the Prayer of St. Ignatius, a.k.a. the Suscipe. Pray it slowly, meaningfully, daily.
38. Go to Mass on Holy Thursday, then spend time afterward in adoration, reading the entire Last Supper discourse of John 13-17.
39. On Good Friday, open up some time, preferably from noon to 3 pm, as a media-free time of silence and prayer.
40. Go to the Easter vigil; if you can't, read the Easter Proclamation and renew your baptismal vows with holy water. Every time you bless yourself with holy water, you are renewing your baptismal vows. So, when you do it, mean it. **EASTER:** Don't just celebrate for one day, but for fifty days, until Pentecost! And don't abandon the new, powerful habits you've built during Lent. Celebrate, but hold your ground until it's time to make new advances next Lent!

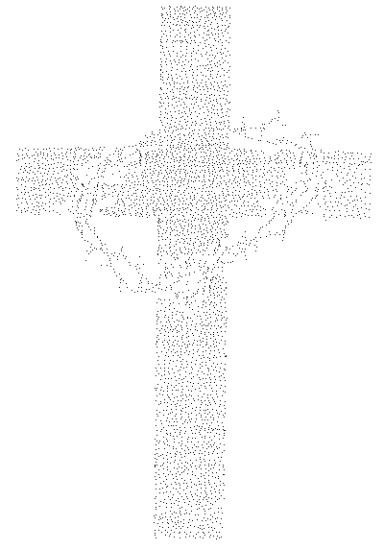

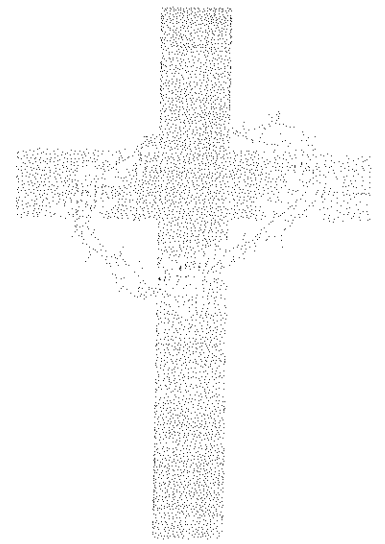
